## Hope For Bulgaria

When we first meet Elena Yordanova many years ago, we knew she would have to serve God and win people to Christ in different ways. Most of the Bulgarian population believe the Church is a cult. Also inside the church, some Christians believe that church is for adults, not youth.

Elena has struggled but has always found unique ways to show God's love to everyone. She has volunteered at state run orphanages, has helped in the community, worked in the schools, and has participated in cross cultural events. During this time she was trained to work with refugees. Recently, someone in the Italian Government / humanitarian work asked her to come help amongst their refugee camps. Below is her story:

I have spent a week in Italy for studying and helping with refugees. This time was so good , hard, and busy. We have tasks to do 12 hours per day. You probably know now Europe has a big problem and challenge with emigrants. Throughout Italy, the boats are coming by thousands. The mafia is taking their documents and in Italy they are coming without identity. They can-

not do anything and at the same time they don't have anywhere to stay, sleep, eat. Italy has made a few refugee camps. The only way to get some food is to work 10 hours a day in agriculture for little money. This is for the men, most women have to work as prostitutes. If she doesn't do this the mafia will kill her.

We visited 2 of these camps, talked with people there. They are full of anger and disappointments and don't know what to do. Some organizations and churches are helping but there are too many people. In one of these camps I went to the brothel house to meet and give food to the women there. It as so hard and sad, they are beaten and have bruised eyes and bruised feet. My heart was so broken seeing so much fear and pain.



Now I'm home and back to school, working with the children there. This year we have a few students who are 15 years old and don't know how to read and write. I'm starting from zero. I talked with them and they know that without writing and reading they don't have chance in this life, no work or no food.

Tomorrow we have elections. Its hard to understand how the mafia forces us to vote for them, otherwise you will not have job anymore, especially in small town where is no work and is so poor. We are a poor, sick, and unhappy nation



Haiti is the first place I traveled, she is where I've spent the most time, she is my second home, she consumes my thoughts and so heavy on my heart.

Haiti is getting worse!


Haiti has had strife and problems for as long as I've been alive. There have been patches of peace, too few and too far between. As soon as it feels like things are turning around for Haiti and her people, something, man made or natural disasters, come and send them into more chaos.



This past year has been more chaotic than most, quiet one day, violent demonstrations the next. This chaos has grown and grown. It is to the point there's no longer any peace. Manifestations, shootings, robbery happens daily. In some areas school started for two days and then closed. Food and water are scarce. People are dying of starvation again.


Life has become this way because: 1. Political strife, 2. the declining dollar and 3. Fuel shortage. For the last year, an opposition party has been working hard to unseat the President of Haiti. Their strategy has been to lock down the country, making life very difficult for the people, therefore putting pressure on the President. The value of the dollar has continually been on the decline, bringing chaos to families who are finding it more difficult every day to put food on the table. The mounting fuel crisis (lack of fuel) has now greatly added to the chaos in the streets. We have read from other missionaries and humanitarian workers the opposition party has poured millions of dollars into these riots and anything else to further there cause, they won't give up now.

PIGNON- Praise God! The situation in Pignon is quiet. Pigeon is a small farming area pretty secluded from the situation in Haiti. They are feeling the crunch of the country but not as severe as other places. First Chris-



ST MARC- St Marc is located between Port-au-Prince and Gonaives, Rt Nationale 1 is their main road in and out of town. Most days St Marc is completely blocked off, no one in and no one out. They are trapped. People are starving. The gangs and protestors are putting notes on the churches saying that if the congregations do not participate in the demonstrations, they cannot go to church. Reports we've heard is only 3 churches have remained open.

PROMISE LAND AREA- This area is on the outskirts of Port-au-Prince. Jean has been keeping the children locked within the compound. Churches are open for those who can get there. Jean says they can get food but prices have tripled since the end of September.

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## Pray for Cuba



Cuba has been having their own set of problems lately. AP News reports the Cuban government announced it is launching widespread rationing of chicken, eggs, rice, beans, soap and other basic products in the face of a grave economic crisis. Commerce Minister Betsy Díaz Velázquez told the state-run Cuban News Agency that various forms of rationing would be employed in order to deal with shortages of staple foods.

Díaz blamed the hardening of the U.S. trade embargo by the Trump administration. Economists give equal or greater blame to a plunge in aid from Venezuela, where the collapse of the state-run oil company has led to a nearly two-thirds cut in shipments of subsidized fuel that Cuba used

for power and to earn hard currency on the open market.

Cuba imports roughly two-thirds of its food at an annual cost of more than \$2 billion and brief shortages of individual products have been common for years. In recent months, a growing number of products have started to go missing for days or weeks at a time, and long lines have sprung up within minutes of the appearance of scarce products like chicken or flour.

"The country's going through a tough moment. This is the right response. Without this, there'll be hoarders. I just got out of work and I was able to buy hot dogs," said Lazara García, a 56-year-old tobacco factory worker.

At the Havana shopping center where García bought her hot dogs, cashiers received orders Friday morning to limit powdered milk to four packets per person, sausages to four packs per person and peas to five packets per person.

Limited rationing of certain products has already begun in many parts of the country, with stores limiting the number of items like bottles of cooking oil that a single shopper can purchase. The policy announced by Díaz appears to go further and apply the same standards across the country of 11 million people.

Díaz said chicken will now be sold in limited quantities. Low-priced soap, rice, bean, peas and eggs will now only be sold in limited quantities per person and controlled through the national system of ration books, she said.

Díaz provided a grim series of statistics on food production by the state-run sector, which has found itself struggling to find the cash it needs to pay for basic inputs. She said that in March Cuba produced 900,000 fewer eggs than the 5.7 million needed daily to satisfy national demand. That deficit shrank to 600,000 by mid-April, she said.

The production of pork, the most-consumed meat in Cuba and a normally affordable staple of most people's diets, is hundreds of tons below target.

"Selling limited quantities will lead to equal distribution, so that the greatest number of people can buy the product, and we can avoid hoarding," she said.

## Pray for Cuba

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Reuters also reported Cuban authorities sought to reassure jittery citizens this week that recent power outages and a fuel shortage were due to temporary problems that were being fixed rather than a broader decline in the economy under heavier U.S. sanctions.



The Communist-run island is battling a cash crunch brought on by a decline in aid from leftist ally Venezuela and lower exports, as well as a tightening of the decades-old U.S. trade embargo, including attempts to block Venezuelan oil shipments.

Sporadic shortages of basic goods are common in the cash-strapped, centrally-planned economy, but have picked up over the past year, with items like flour, chicken and milk becoming scarce for weeks and sometimes months.

Vehicle owners have struggled to locate gas stations in Havana stocked with the upper grades of gasoline in the past few weeks, and when they do they have been forced to queue for hours to tank up.

"This is the third gas station we've visited," Rodolfo Romero said. "And when there is any fuel, there's a kilometer-long queue."

Tomás Pérez Álvarez, the head of sales at state-owned oil company Cuba-Petroleo, confirmed on Friday on the midday news broadcast on state television that there had been a deficit in fuel distribution, which he said would be fixed by next week.

He said there has been a 10 percent increase in consumption because there are now more vehicles on the road. The government has imported hundreds of microbuses over the past year to improve public transport.

Cubans have also been complaining on social media of a string of power outages, this time outside the capital, raising for some the specter of a return to the long blackouts of the economic crisis following the fall of benefactor the Soviet Union.

Energy Minister Raul Garcia earlier this week sought to reassure citizens that the outages were due to breakdowns in power plants rather than a lack of oil, and said the problems should be solved by this weekend.

Cuba's government has become more responsive since it introduced mobile internet, which has given Cubans a public forum to express discontent and directly address authorities.
